"DIDN'T WE HAVE A LOVELY TIME THE DAY WE WENT TO LOUGHBROUGH!"



As with the last trip when we went to Wedgwood and Trentham Gardens the sun did not want to shine for this year's Mystery Tour but for the 32 of us who boarded the bus in Radcliffe this in no way effected the excitement.

Our first task was to write down where we thought we were going and of course until we arrived at our first destination on the bus nobody was sure whether they had guessed correctly.

First stop was The John Taylor Bell foundry in Loughborough where we were shown a short video following the development in the art of English bell founding over at least 600 years. It was fascinating to learn that the complex of buildings making up the foundry and works as they are today were purpose built in the 1850's and its size demonstrates the extent of the market for bells at that time. Bells are still cast regularly and we were taken around the buildings to see the foundry and furnaces in operation.

This bell foundry is just one of two that are still in production in the UK and we were able to visit their Museum which is the only one in the country dedicated to the subject.

At the end of the tour we were all very ready for a drink and sit-down so we had a short walk or coach ride to the "Three Nuns" pub where lunch had been arranged and jolly good it was too! After a leisurely interlude we boarded the bus for our next 'mystery' stop.

Winding down a country lane in Costock we were amazed to see a sign for The Eglantine Vineyard where we disembarked to be greeted by one of the owners, Veronica Skuriat who explained that they had been growing vines and making wine Since 1979. It was too wet to walk through the vineyard but both Veronica and her husband Tony talked to us in their winery . We learnt their story of what they do eachyear and how they produce 6,000

bottles each year that are sold to Waitrose and other independent Nottinghamshire retailers throughout the year. We then enjoyed a tasting of their red and white wines and their superb International Award Winning desert wine, "North Star".

Purchases were made and we then very merrily boarded the coach for the journey home. I was the winner of the 'Guess our Destination' competition and besides being given my prize of a delicious jar of homemade jam from the vineyard Steve Harris told me

I had to write this piece for the magazine!


