TODAY'S GUEST SPEAKER

The speaker will be **Dr Irfan Malik**. The topic is the story of Dulmial village.

Dr Irfan Malik is a Nottingham GP, born in the city. His family originated from Dulmial, a village in the Punjab, Pakistan. In 1914 Dulmial was part of India and sent 460 of its men to fight with the British Army, the largest participation of any village in Asia. In recognition of their service, the British government offered the village an award of their choosing. What did they choose? How did the award, made in Scotland, reach the mountainous village? Where is it today?

Dr Malik's research on what happened at Dulmial after WWI has attracted much attention. Last autumn he was interviewed on Sky News and by The Telegraph about the now famous award given to the village. Don't miss the opportunity to hear his intriguing story.



TRIPS & OUTINGS GROUP

Trip to Rockingham Castle near Corby in Northamptonshire.

A Victorian Christmas.

"It is Christmas Eve, 1849. The staff are preparing the Castle for the family's Christmas celebrations. Under the butler's direction the Great Hall table is laid, the silver is polished, the candles and fires are lit, the decorations are in place and the kitchen is a hive of activity". So the scene was set for a very enjoyable day out.

A really good roast turkey lunch in the Walkers House Restaurant was followed by a guided tour of the castle. Our 51 strong party was divided into three groups with each group having a 'themed' guide. The first group was led by the Footman, the Governess led the next group and the third group had the House Keeper. The Guides were in character throughout the tour and almost brought the time period alive. Starting in the sparsely furnished Servants Hall we then entered the kitchen where some of the family's Christmas feast was laid out – it included dates stuffed with marzipan, oranges studded with cloves, mince pies (made with meat) and a highly decorated Christmas cake. We continued on to the sitting room called the Panel Room then dining room before going up to the Long Gallery. Everywhere there were real log fires, Christmas trees and decorations. As one person put it "it all looked very homely".

We thoroughly enjoyed the day which was, in no small part down to the Staff at the Castle. We are especially grateful to the catering staff who worked extremely hard both in the restaurant and in the café.

A brief history of Rockingham Castle.

Shortly after the Norman invasion in the 11 century William the Conqueror ordered a Motte and Bailey Castle to be built at Rockingham. Within three decades William 11 replaced it with a stone castle and over the centuries it was added to. It remained in Royal ownership until Sir Edward Watson obtained a lease from Henry V111. Parts of the castle were subsequently replaced with a Tudor house with gardens and it became a hunting lodge for the nobility. Edwards Grandson later went on to purchase the Rockingham Estate from the Crown. For over 450 years the Castle has remained in the hands of the same family.

FILM APPRECIATION GROUP

'Capernaum', my film choice for February proved to be a show stopper with members. My trepidations in suggesting this Beirut street flic proved unfounded and we were treated to an emotional rollercoaster that produced a 'best film I've ever seen', three maximum ten out of ten scores and scattering of nines. Phew!

It was the 'true' story of a child's battle for survival and identity in a refugee community. Painful, remorseless, unflinching, gut wrenching it certainly was, yet funny and with the ability to lift the soul. Director Nadine Labaki's depiction of the rawness of life in the streets in Beirut, enhanced by the hand held low level camera work of her crew, was so real you could chew it. Her mission clearly is that none of us should forget how the other half is forced to exist. The realism of the film is perhaps epitomised by the fate of Yordanos Shiferaw, playing the illegal immigrant mother. She was arrested when the picture was released for being just that.

Zain Al Rafeca may not slip easily off the tongue but the twelve year old playing the lead without any acting experience must surely be a name the future. His performance and his relationship with his black toddler companion prompted much discussion in the Group.

We chose 'Border' as our film for March, mainly I think because the of its mysterious and intriguing storyline.
