A STORM IN A TEASHOP

At our last meeting we were treated to a very entertaining talk and slide show by Dr Ann Featherstone entitled "Storm in a Teashop".

On 8th April 1908 during the lunchtime rush the waitresses at the Cabin restaurant on Piccadilly Circus put down their trays and came out on strike. They were very poorly paid, out of their wages (about 6 shillings per week) they had to provide their own uniform, pay for their food and any breakages. The catalyst came when one of their number was wrongly dismissed. They were all threatened with the sack as their action had closed the restaurant. They refused to return to work and were dismissed. They were undeterred and had popular support. They decided to go into business for themselves. Under the leadership of waitress Miss "Ken" Ware they raised money to open their own co-operative restaurant. They were let down by their first sponsor but eventually opened a successful restaurant "Ken's Kabin" on Brompton Road. These waitresses were not part of any political party or Suffragettes, but radical women who wanted to be in charge of their own destiny. The accompanying slide show contained many interesting and historical photos of the characters and their premises.

AVIATION & AEROSPACE GROUP



The first is Brian Cleary who will give us a talk on 'John Ford' - Fighter, Test pilot and Co-pilot of the ill-fated Avro Vulcan that crashed at RAF Syerston in September 1958. After a short refreshment break this will be followed by a second speaker, Professor Joe Colls. The theme of this talk is the commercialisation of space activities. The talk focusses on recent developments at Space X with their Starship project, together with progress at Blue Origin, Virgin Galactic, and other newcomers. Both speakers have given talks to us before and both are excellent speakers and deeply knowledgeable of their respective subjects. It should be a memorable and most interesting occasion and I look forward to welcoming members and new potential members.

GEOLOGY & ENVIRONMENTAL STUDIES GROUP

Meets on the 3rd Wednesday in the month. Our most recent meeting, on 16th March, took the form of a Quiz based on rock, fossil and mineral specimens plus photos of geological landforms and some simple map structures all, resulted in 2hrs of lively discussion, very well organised by Greg Chapman and Bob Addison.

The next meeting, on 20th April, follows on from Bob's "Ice Ages" talk but concentrates on the most recent 20,000 yrs. of Earth History during which time the last ice age waned and Homo Sapiens was the only surviving human species following earlier extinction of the Neanderthals. Britain and Europe were joined until 8,000 BP (Before Present) when rising sea levels flooded what has become known as Dogger Land which now lies beneath the North Sea. Remarkably, everything we might call civilisation (DISCUSS), has developed in these last 8000 years, from farming, through writing to the internet. Drawing inspiration from Samuel Pepys Diaries, he also investigated the medical procedures of that era. He hilariously described and demonstrated some pretty eye-watering operations. Without going into too much detail the demonstrations involved a dummy, a cucumber, a bunch of grapes and a mallet amongst other things! I will leave the rest to your imagination.



Finally on a more serious note David talked about the Great Plague and its devastating effect on the family that lived in his house during those times, drawing parallels with the current Pandemic.

We hope you enjoyed the event which drew two rounds of applause at the end.
