Church visiting Group

Our first visit of the season, in April, was to Wollaton Parish Church. Here one of the many highlights was the digitalised copy of the Illuminated Medieval Antiphonal Manuscript, the original now being in the care of Nottingham University Archives.

In May we had a guided tour of Newark Parish Church. This is one of the largest Medieval Churches in the country where half a dozen of the group was brave enough to ascend the narrow spiral staircase up the tower to the base of the spire. This is the view from the top <

Langar Parish Church, said to be the Cathedral of the Vale had many surprises. On entering the building, we were amazed to see red chairs facing North, not east, assembled in a semi-circle, and much of the plaster peeled off the walls, ready for Damp proof treatment.

Other surprises were well hidden behind curtains in the crossing.

We were lucky to have two well informed guides on this occasion, Nigel covering the history of the area and Robin for information on the church. Following the visit the group walked the few yards into Langar Hall. Here were invited to explore the ground floor of the Hotel before enjoying coffee and a hand made

chocolate in our own private room. All great fun.

July took us to visit the two churches in Colston Bassett. St John the Devine was organised and paid for by a local Benefactor in the late 19th Century and was said by Pevsner to one of the prettiest Parish Churches in England. Edward proved to be a most entertaining and informative guide.

The majority of the group then did the 15 minute walk through the fields to the remains of St Mary's Church on the hill top outside the village. This was the original Parish Church and is still the only burial ground for the village. Here there was plenty of interest, geology, archaeology, architecture and

history and a fair degree of detective work!! We had hoped to enjoy a coffee in the lovely grounds of the Martin's Arms but sadly they were closed for refurbishment.


