On a grey day in early 2012 my wife, Bev, and three others met at the Royal Oak. We met with a representative from the Regional Office, who deals with advising people who want to set up a new u3a in their area. After the initial chat Bev, myself and the others decided to investigate starting up a u3a group in the village.

After a few months we had arranged an open meeting in the Grange, attended by about 100 people. The representative told us about how we start up the group. At that meeting we set up a working committee, which Dave Barton volunteered to chair & at that point Bev & I joined the committee. After 13 years I am still on the committee acting as Business Secretary and after subsequently fulfilling many roles (including committee chairmn for three years) Dave Barton was honoured by being voted Life President of our U3a.

I am pleased to say we have seen our u3a grow with over 600 members & over 50 groups & it is the biggest organisation in the village. A great achievement by all of us.

OUR u3a DURING COVID LOCKDOWN

During Covid Lockdown the committee felt that our members really had little or no contact or support from us.

We discussed 'Zoom' meetings which were becoming very popular but would not suit us as at that time many of our members did not have internet access. We used this for committee meetings and some groups were able to use it also.

The committee discussed this and one of our committee suggested producing a TV programme for the u3a on Notts local TV as we had a contact at the TV studios. ALL our members would be able to access this on their TV's. It was decided this was worth investigating. We met on Zoom with the production staff who agreed to do this (although it was quite expensive!!) and eventually we agreed to a trial program. Our first TV programme called NG30 which was on shown live on Notts TV. Sat 29th September 7.30pm on Channel 7 Freeview and Channel 159 Virgin with a repeat in September. We put a notice about this in the Newsletter.

The producers agreed to using a local person as speaker but they wished to make the final decision as some speakers 'freeze' when going out live. We wanted a local speaker to talk about something of interest to Nottingham residents. Our first TV progamme was called NG30 (a Nottingham person in 30 minutes) in Sept 2020. The Speaker was a local man Barrie Page, geologist and mountaineer.

This was very successful so we booked a mini series of 5 more productions one to be screened in January, (as the dreaded Lockdown prevented December production). The committee felt that this challenging venture has given our members a better alternative than trying to produce our monthly speaker online via Zoom or some other platform. We hope they agreed

We felt this went some way to keeping u3a alive and ensuring our members did not loose out.

Our second speaker was Laura Parker a local archaeologist. At the end of Lockdown we went on to produce 4 more TV episodes.

Also at the end of Lockdown we decided to cancel the annual membership subscription for one year as we had been unable to provide our regular monthly meeting with a speaker.

We liked to think that these actions by the u3a committee helped our u3a members to keep going throughout Lockdown.

REAL ALE GROUP

The Real Ale Group was originally envisaged and set up when the u3a was created in Radcliffe on Trent over ten years ago by Bill Sylvester on the simple basis that once a month the group decided which public house, selling real ale (cask ale), they wanted to visit at lunch time on the last Wednesday of each month. Always somewhere accessible by public transport and also on the understanding each member pays for their own drinks, no rounds and no kitty!

The establishments visited should also have character and be of interest.

In 2013 Bill and family left Radcliffe and Rodney Fogg took on the responsibility of being Group Leader and has enjoyed it ever since. The group of both male and female, no discrimination here, have always been an interesting and lively social group with a strong interest in maintaining the British Public House and the continuing production of traditional real ale.

Meeting each month in the year, except for December when pubs are bursting at the seams, means the group have visited, during the last 10 years, over one hundred public houses in the area, though some have been visited more than once!

The group also annually visit the Nottingham Robin Hood Beer Festival, originally held at Nottingham Castle but now more recently at the Nottinghamshire County Cricket Ground at Trent Bridge where over a 1000 real ales are available to sample!

Like many popular u3a groups the number of members out-grew the capacity of the group to work efficiently and two years ago had to divide in to two groups. The second group, now called The Real Ale Trail, has a different ethos from The Real Ale Group and as its group name suggests, visits more than one establishment when it meets.

The original Real Ale Group has a maximum of 15 members and likes to think it also embraces the u3a ethos of being "educational".

Over the years visiting and touring Breweries and Micro-Breweries, has meant learning much about brewing techniques as well as about the history of many of the public houses visited.











FRIENDSHIP AND SUPPORT GROUP

GEOLOGY AND ENVIRONMENTAL STUDIES GROUP.

Our first Meeting was in July 2014 when 16 folk met in the Memorial Park on the Cliff including Dave & Sylvia Barton, Sian Barnard, Brian Cannel, Dave & Maggy Holmes, Howard & Pat Kennington, Graham Leigh-Brown, Stephanie Seabright, John Parry, Rosie Garner, Peter Jackson and Peter Straw,

We examined the Cliff above the weir which exposes good outcrop of typical Radcliffe Triassic age bedrock - reddish clay-rich sedimentary rocks approx. 240 million years old cut by veins of pale grey Gypsum.

Since then we have met, usually monthly, about 100 times, many of which involved field trips to, e.g. 600 million yr. old volcanic rocks in Charnwood, Leadmines in Derbyshire, on-shore oil fields in Notts., Creswell Crags archaeological site, Osprey at Rutland water, etc. Additionally many topics have been presented as talks, currently these are related to investigating the development and origin of our own species, Homo sapiens.

The two photos show some of our mineral collection and our group underground during a visit to the National Coalmine Museum, Wakefield.





The three members mainly responsible for guiding this group's activities, Bob Addison, Greg Chapman and Martin Clarke were all employed at the British Geological Survey based at Keyworth.

None of us are experts but the internet is now a mighty source of information allowing those, like us, studying at the **University of the Third Age** to be in contact with modern thought and theory within our own homes or interest groups.
