TRIPS & OUTINGS - PLANS FOR 2025

We will be selling tickets at the Monthly Meeting on the 2 nd January

In April we plan to visit Bletchley Hall, on Tuesday 15th . Bletchley is world famous for De-Coding the Germans Codes, including the less well known but as important 'Fish' changed to 'Tunny' at Bletchley and the more famous Enigma machine. They also developed Colossus, the first large-scale electronic computer, which went into operation in 1944. The cost is anticipated to be £36 pp incl. Coach and Entry to Bletchley Hall.

On Wednesday 14th May we will visit Bradford, as it celebrates being the City of Culture in 2025. We plan to visit the Science and Media Museum followed by either the Industrial or the Peace museum. Plans will be confirmed when we know what date the Science and Media Museum reopens in 2025, following a massive refurbishment. Anticipated cost will be £26 this will include a £10 Food Voucher

On Tuesday June 10th we will visit Cambridge on a Coach only basis, giving our members a freestyle visit. We will send, prior to the visit, via email comprehensive information on the attractions. One suggestion highly recommended is the Botanical Gardens a 15 minute walk from the town centre. Anticipated cost £18 pp

In July, we will once again consider visiting the Kilworth Outdoor Theatre, but are waiting for confirmation of the production they will be putting on, before we commit.

In September we will arrange a visit to Salford Quays and the Lowry Museum. We will also visit the BBC Studios, costings to follow nearer the time.


Bletchley Park - Tuesday 15th April 2025 - £38 pp including coach and entrance

Our first trip for 2025 will be to Bletchley Park, the home of England's Codebreakers and probably the best kept secret of the World War 2. Without doubt some of their most important findings saved many lives and shortened the length of the war. Within Bletchley Park there was brought together some of the most intelligent and original minds in England, who were able to decipher the most complex German codes. This ensured we were in many cases able to anticipate the German plans. The most well known action was to break the Enigma machine codes that the Germans thought was impossible, and you will be able to see a captured Enigma. There are Interactive displays, Immersive films, Museum collections and Colossus the world's first large-scale electronic digital computer, so plenty for you to fill your time during the visit.

The National Science and Media Museum, is in the heart of Bradford, it explores the science and culture of light and sound technologies and their impact on our lives. With the aim of inspiring the scientists and innovators of the future, it invites visitors to see more, hear more, think more and do more.

Its galleries and exhibition spaces help illuminate world-famous collections in photography, film and television. Explainers create learning activities that fuel the imagination and investigate the collections and exhibitions. Three cinema screens—including an IMAX theatre—showcase the magic of moving images from around the world in Bradford, the first UNESCO City of Film.
