u3a FILM CLUB

Reviews the Springsteen Biopic 'Deliver Me From Nowhere'

Selected by all members, as always by majority vote from the up-coming screenings list, this biopic was a gift to Springsteen aficionados. To those less familiar with the 'blue collar' US rock hero, it told a novel tale. Spontaneous starter votes from members ranged from 2 to 9 out of 10. Reminiscences of outstanding 'Bruce' concerts attended, favourite albums and anecdotes enjoyed were shared by his loyal fans.

The story led us through 1982, a dark Springsteen year when the ultimate American working-class rock god penned and recorded 'Nebraska' in his bedroom, like a gloomy teenager. He wrote, sang and played good but very different acoustic numbers throughout his solitary sessions. His record company was agitating for more heavy rock numbers, his manager, a childhood friend, was more sympathetic. Bruce stuck to his guns and the album was cut with great difficulty, trying to eliminate the hisses and clicks in the original recording. Even with dodgy sound it was a Number 1 album hit.

The tried and tested 'black and white' flash-back scenes revealed his high anxiety childhood, threatened by a hard drinking violent father and a loving but sadly cowed mother. His demons, struggles with fame and musical uncertainties were writ large.



A fabricated, unsuccessful 'love interest' was added in the shape of a comely single-parent and her pre-teen daughter to further emphasise his emotional dysfunction. Even the car salesman who sold him his first fast and fancy motor was drawn in to underscore his misery. 'I know who you are' opines the sales rep. 'I wish I did' mumbles Bruce in reply. It was agreed - a bit hackneyed but there you go, kick the scriptwriters. Interestingly, Springsteen was working on the ultimate rock anthem 'Born in the USA' which shot The Boss (his nickname) to global stardom at the same time as 'Nebraska'

Jeremy Allen White was given the thumbs up for his Springsteen on-screen portrayal. He didn't look much like him but brought out what we think we know of the essence of the man. Soundtrack was good as you'd expect, and the cinematography was also fine. The real Springsteen was regularly on set and gave the movie the thumbs up. Second voting round at the end of the session upped the numbers to a respectable average of 7.5 with even the first scorer of 2 rising to the heady heights of 3.



AVIATION GROUP The Schneider Trophy Air Races and Military Drones



Our next meeting will be on **Tue 6 Jan at 2pm** in the Trent Room in Grange Hall. Our speaker will be Brian Fernley, who will talk to us about the **Schneider Trophy Air Races** were seaplane races held initially to encourage technical advances in civil aviation but became a contest for pure speed. The race was held twelve times between 1913 and 1931, the year when it was finally won permanently by the British.

The races were significant in advancing aeroplane design and were instrumental in developing the best fighters of World War II, most famously the Spitfire.

A date for your diary For our following meeting on **Tue 3 Feb**, we are pleased to announce that our speaker will be **Air Chief Marshall Sir Andrew Pulford**, a recent Chief of Air Staff, who will be talking to us about '**Military Drones – Master or Servant?**'

'The ongoing war in Ukraine against the illegal Russian invasion has focused a great deal of media and public

interest on the role being played on both sides by the huge number of tactical and strategic drones.'

Western militaries too, having been studying the development of the systems, their application and the tactics required to employ and counter them. All of this is taking place at a time when new, ever-more sophisticated drones are being brought into service around the world, yet the legal aspects of their use are far from certain, and the impact of AI and machine learning is yet to be fully understood. So, are modern military drones the master or servant of military capability?

This will be a most current and interesting talk from a high-quality speaker and we anticipate that demand will be high. Please contact me if you wish to attend, so that we manage seating requirements.
